

F-1 News

What a busy fortnight it has been in Foundation/ Year 1.

So much learning and fun to be had!

Literacy

Students have continued to enjoy working in their daily Reading Rotations where they have been working in small groups to develop and foster their reading skills. Students have been learning to retell stories and looking at the characters, setting, middle and ending in the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and 'Goldilocks and The Three Bears'. They have particularly enjoyed our craft rotation where they made their own caterpillars and bears which are proudly hanging in our classroom. Other rotational tasks have included listening to stories on Epic and developing our understanding of letters and sounds as part of the Sound Waves Program.



In writing students have been focusing on letter formation and writing a retell of the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. On Friday students brought home their 'Hungry Caterpillar Food Diary' where they wrote the foods the caterpillar ate each day.



Numeracy

Students have been learning all about patterns and how they repeat. They had lots of fun creating their own patterns using unifix blocks, shapes and mini teddy bears. Our Year 1 students looked at how patterns can grow and continue. This week in Numeracy students are learning the days of the week. You may like to practise these at home and talk to your child each day about what day of the week, it is to reinforce our learning.



Inquiry

This term our Inquiry focus has been 'Places People Live'. students have looked at different places including their home, special places to them and places they belong to. Our next step in our inquiry process will be learning about how and why people, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, look after places. Students will then look at how the location of places can be represented with maps.

Year 2 - 3 News

Writing: Over the last week, students have been working on creating their own comic strip around the topic 'Eek! A Spider!' This was drawn from our mentor text 'Little Boy Blue' where one of the many nursery rhyme characters was Little Miss Muffet. The task required students to pretend that they were Little Miss Muffet when the spider sat down beside her and imagine how they would react to the situation. Some students felt similarly to Miss Muffet and were frightened of the spider, while other students felt that they would react calmly and say hello to the little spider. To successfully complete the task, students had to create a logically sequenced series of events to fill the comic strip frames and insert character voice using dialogue and onomatopoeia to describe their reaction using sound effects. Numeracy: Over the last two weeks, students have been learning about Time. We started by looking at the months of the year and making connections between the months, seasons and special events throughout the year. Students then used their understanding of the months to read and solve problems using calendars. One topic that came up with this was of course the 'leap year' which had our 2/3s feeling very curious about the need for an extra day every four years. Our next step in our learning about Time was to read analogue clocks to tell the time. This week we began by revising the features of an



analogue clock and reading o'clock and half- past times, before we extended our learning to reading guarter -to and -past times and telling time using five-minute intervals.

Respectful Relationships: In our learning around Respectful Relationship this term, the 2/3s have been unpacking different emotions and categorising them as either positive emotions (emotions we like to feel) and negative emotions (emotions we don't like to feel). This week students connected a range of positive and negative emotions to situations that may trigger these emotions either within the classroom or out in the yard.

Year 4/5/6 News

I can't believe it is almost the end of Term 1! What a crazy term it has been, too!

Over the past two weeks in Literacy, 4/5/6 students have been working diligently towards their goal of reading ten books in Term 1. Some students have already surpassed this goal and many have found new favourite books and series' that they are truly enjoying, which has been great to see.

In Writing we have been working on creating our own fractured fairy tales. Each student has picked a fairy tale or nursery rhyme that they know well and brainstormed a number of ideas on how to 'fracture' their tale – changing one element in order to create an altered version of the original. We have had some amazing ideas! From viewing their tales from the perspective of the villain, to changing animals into people and people into animals!

The 4/5/6s also had great fun writing about our special delivery earlier this week. Many took on the very serious role of detective to figure out who sent the box, and what on earth escaped from it! There was lots of brilliant discussion and radical writing on the subject.

In Numeracy, students have been working on a project called Geometry City. They have built their knowledge of different types of angles and used this knowledge to design their own city, meeting a checklist of criteria. It has been fantastic seeing students work collaboratively on this big project, listening to the ideas of their fellow town-planners and troubleshooting in order to fulfil the brief.

Chess Club News – We have taken the game of chess to whole new levels recently, fishing out our giant chess set and playing with it in the fresh air while the weather has been nice. Students have loved bringing a collaborative element to the game, by working in teams and discussing strategy as they play. This has been really helpful for some of our younger students who are developing a better understanding of how each piece moves by looking at it on a larger scale.







FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
 changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.
