This week in Inquiry, students investigated the le features of a range of animals. Students then se features to group animals based on common e.g. number of legs, wings, colour and so on. dents had had a go at this themselves, they were ed to the scientific method used to classify with backbones (vertebrae). This involved developing their understanding of the following nammals, amphibians, reptiles, birds and fish. then revisited the same animals and re-grouped ng this method.





Child Care Subsidy



From 10 July 2023, there are changes to the way we work out your Child Care Subsidy (CCS) entitlement. Child care will be cheaper for most families.

Vhat you need to know

- The maximum amount of CCS is increasing from 85% to 90% for families earning up to \$80,000.
- The income limit for CCS is increasing to \$530,000.
- If you earn over \$80,000, your CCS percentage will go down by 1% for each \$5,000 of income your family earns. You'll either get more subsidy or have no change to your entitlement. The CCS percentage you're entitled to depends on your family's income.

amilies with more than one child aged 5 or under

rom 10 July 2023, if you have more than one child ged 5 or under you can still get a higher rate for one r more of your children.

f you get Additional Child Care Subsidy

you get Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS) our rates will stay the same.

rom 10 July 2023, the low income limit for ACCS ransition to Work (TTW) will increase to \$80,000. our family will still need to meet other ACCS TTW igibility requirements.

CHANGES TO CHILD CARE SUBSIDY

Making a claim for CCS

rom 10 July 2023 the income limit for CCS is ncreasing to \$530,000. This means that more families vill be entitled to CCS to reduce their child care costs.

f you want to check your eligibility for CCS, ou can make a claim using your Centrelink online occount through myGov or your Express Plus Centrelink mobile app.

f you make a claim and it's assessed before 0 July 2023, you may be assessed at 0% if your ncome is over \$356,756. Your new rate of CCS will utomatically apply to you from 10 July 2023.

What you need to do from January to June 2023

In most cases, you don't need to do anything to get increased rate. If you get CCS, we'll apply changes your CCS automatically from 10 July 2023.

Updating your family income estimate

The amount of CCS you get is calculated using you family income estimate. It's important to make sur you check your income estimate regularly and upd if your circumstances change.

If you get CCS or if you're already assessed for CCS but get 0%, you may be eligible for an increased rat Check your family income estimate is up to date so get the right amount from 10 July 2023.

You can check or update your income estimate at any time using:

- your Centrelink online account through my.gov.a
- the Express Plus Centrelink mobile app
- the myGov app.


